Applicants should possess a PhD in Sociology (or be near completion of a PhD in Sociology). Applicants are expected to have teaching experience in quantitative research methods and to contribute to one other area of departmental strength.

The successful candidate will be primarily responsible for assisting us in the delivery of our quantitative and mixed methods courses.

- a current curriculum vitae;
- a teaching dossier that includes evidence of teaching effectiveness, teaching evaluations (if available), sample course syllabi/outlines, and a statement of teaching philosophy and interests
- a research statement detailing research interests and potential for scholarly achievement;
- samples of scholarly work;
- graduate transcripts, and
- three current letters of reference forwarded by the referees.
