CPS Lifetime Achievement Award

Dr. Zheng Wu was posthumously awarded the 2021 Lifetime Achievement Award at the meeting of General Assembly. Over the course of his career, Zheng published four books, two edited special issues of academic journals, twelve chapters in books, more than 80 referred articles, and numerous other publications. He was one of the first scholars to recognize the importance of societal shifts toward cohabitation, but his interests extended beyond union formation and dissolution to childlessness, caregiving, immigration, social integration, and the physical and psychological well-being of middle-aged and older adults. As a mentor and colleague, Zheng offered both moral support and straight-shooting advice on how to secure success as an academic. He was also extremely generous, loyal, and kind. Finally, Zheng served the Canadian Population Society in numerous leadership roles, including President, Vice-President, Councillor, and Associate/Guest Editor of Canadian Studies in Population. Zheng also worked to represent Canadian demography

on the international stage, whether it was through formal research affiliations and guest lectures, participation in conferences, and editorial board activities.

CPS Student Paper Award

Congratulations to **Chi-lan Winnie Yang** of McGill University who was named as winner of the 2021 CPS graduate student paper competition. Winnie's paper "Marriage Equality or Socioeconomic Inequality? Couple-Level Socioeconomic Predictors of Same-Sex Marriage in Canada between 2006 and 2016," involved analyzing three waves of Census data from 2006, 2011, and 2016 to evaluate whether labour market characteristics and economic resources are associated with marriage among Canadian same-sex couples.



The CPS student paper award is conferred annually at its national conference. The competition serves to showcase the high quality of research in areas relevant to demography and encourages the participation of emerging scholars by providing a forum for paper

presentation and feedback. The committee deciding the award this year was comprised of Stacey Hallman and France-Pascale Ménard, both of Statistics Canada.

Webinars, Workshops, and Seminars

Brookings. Time to Change How We Measure Poverty? Webcast on June 9, 2021, 2:00-3:30 pm EDT. In 2019, the Chief Statistician of the United States formed an interagency working group to evaluate alternative measures of poverty. This webcast features a presentation of the final report of the working group and a panel of discussants on the report.

The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine is hosting a series of webinars based on the report *High and Rising Mortality Rates among Working-Aged Adults*. The series begins on June 10, 2010.

IUSSP Webinar Series. Since March, the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population has held two segments of their webinar series, which have been recorded. On April 9, there was a webinar on Population, Food, and the Environment that featured a debate on the impact of population growth on food supplies, depletion of resources, and poverty. The debate, held jointly with the Population Association of America, featured David Lam, Stan Becker, Shirley Mustafa, John Bongaarts, and Raya Muttarak as panelists. Leiwen Jiang was the moderator of the debate. There is a video of the debate and slide shows for the panelists' presentations.

On June 1, there was an IUSSP webinar that asks: Should FP Programs in Patriarchal Societies Use Limited Funds to Further Empower Women or to Involve Men? This webinar featured four panelists who took turns debating either side of this question.

The Population-Environment Research Network (PERN) of the IUSSP held a cyberseminar on refugee and internally displaced populations, environmental impacts, and climate risks from May 10-19. Presentations from the invited experts are available online:

The Department of Social Development and Statistics South Africa will be hosting the 1st National Conference on Migration and Urbanisation on July 26-39, 2021. The conference will be a virtual format.

Population Europe is holding an online seminar on estimating international migration flows on June 17, 2021 starting at 8:00 am EDT (register here). The seminar is organized under the World Bank's Knowledge Partnership on Migration and Development.

The **5th Asian Population Association Conference** has been re-scheduled for August 3-5, 2021. The virtual conference will bring together scholars, researchers, policymakers, and government officials to discuss Asian population issues. It will include live sessions, pre-recorded video sessions, and poster sessions. There will be an inclusive program with close to 200 live presentations and talks and a large number of pre-recorded talks and posters. The video sessions and posters will be hosted online and will be available for at least six months after the conference.

Data Products

Canadian Income Survey (CIS) – Territorial estimates, 2018. The CIS collected data on the three territories for the first time in 2019 (for the reference year 2018). This new data covers 96% of the population in the Northwest Territories, 93% for Nunavut, and 92% for the Yukon.

Survey on Early Learning and Child Care Arrangements (SELCCA), 2020. The SELCCA provides information on child care use during the COVID-19 pandemic that can be compared to pre-pandemic patterns. The target population was children aged 0 to 5 years from the provinces and territories. The data were collected from November 10, 2020 to January 11, 2021, and included a sample size of 10,605 children. An infographic of childcare arrangements across Canada is available on the Statistics Canada website. Data tables on child care use and reasons for non-use are also available.

Aboriginal Peoples Survey (APS) – Data tables, 2017. Data tables are available on cultural engagement and sense of belonging and Internet use.

2019 General Social Survey (GSS) – Canadians' Safety. The full dataset for the 2019 GSS is now available.

In Brief

COVID-19 and Telework. According to the Labour Force Survey (LFS), 3.1 million Canadians were teleworking in February 2021. At the beginning of 2021, 32% of Canadian employees worked mostly from home, which compares to a pre-pandemic rate of 4% in 2016. Most teleworkers (90%) reported that their current level of productivity was similar or greater than their pre-telework level, and 80% prefer to continue to telework once the pandemic is over.

A new study reports that COVID-19 mortality rates were higher for the population living in apartments and larger households. In Quebec, the COVID-19 mortality rate for persons living in high-rise apartments was 2.5 higher than for persons living in single detached houses. In Ontario, it was almost twice as high.
