CPS Business

2023 CPS Meeting Recap

The 2023 CPS annual meeting was held in a hybrid format from May 31st to June 2nd as part of the 2023 Congress. The final program included a total of 10 regular sessions and one poster session. There were 38 paper presentations and 8 posters, with a total of 86 authors. Under the hybrid format, two-thirds of the presentations were made in-person and one-third were online. This year had 8 international presenters affiliated with institutions outside Canada, such as Germany, Italy, Iran, Hong Kong, and the United States. Two-thirds of the presenters were students.

Special Events

Two special events were held, thanks to generous offers from Environics Analytics and Statistics Canada. A session entitled "What is applied demography and why does it matter" was organized by Doug Norris from Environics Analytics. The panelists included David Swanson (Portland State), Doug Norris, and Alison

Yacyshyn (Concordia University, Edmonton), with **Jan Kestle**, President of Environics Analytics, as a discussant

and CPS President, **Amélie Quesnel-Vallée** (McGill) as the session chair.

Julien Bérard-Chagnon (Statistics Canada) organized a session entitled "Examining recent Canadian demographic trends: New developments from Statistics Canada's Centre for Demography." The presentations from the Centre for Demography included:

- An overview of Canada's linguistic profile: Insights from the 2021 Census – Bertrand Ouellet-Léveillé;
- Recent initiatives from the Family Analysis
 Program Claudine Provencher and Nora
 Galbraith;
- Motivation to move: Analyzing internal migration trends and motivation to move from the 2018 and 2021 Canadian Housing Survey – Karl Chastko, Patrick Charbonneau, and David Pelletier; and
- Canada in 2041: A larger, more diverse population with greater differences between regions – Jean-Dominique Morency.

CPS Awards

The 2023 CPS annual Best Student Paper Award was awarded to **Michaela Bunakova** (McGill University) for the paper entitled "Marry a doctor, live longer: A quantitative study of spousal dyad health influence under different macro-policy contexts." In addition, the CPS introduced two new student grant/award opportunities. Environics Analytics' Student Travel Grant, made possible

thanks to a donation from Environics Analytics. Eight students were awarded \$250 each, including Khandys Agnant (McGill University), Maria Ahmed (Western University), Marcus Vinicius Leite Fraga (Laval University), Rahul Kumar (International Institute for Population Sciences), Sen Li (The Chinese University of Hong Kong), Sree Sanyal (Jawaharlal Nehru University), and Sumi Sasudevan (McMaster University). Michaela Bunakova and Marwa Ramada (McGill) were awarded Congress Graduate Merit Awards of \$500.


Briefs

A new study on Accumulation of human capital in Canada, 1970 to 2020 reported that the average human capital of women in 2020 was lower than that of men, but the gender gap decreased over the past five decades because of rapid growth in women's human capital. In

1970, the average human capital of women was 35% of that of men, which doubled to 70% by 2020. Women accounted for a large proportion of human capital growth from 1970 to 2020, and their contribution to total human capital increased from 30% to 41%.

The article High school academic performance and earning by postsecondary field of study found that differences in earnings across fields of study among Canadians who graduated from a bachelor's degree program between 2010 and 2013 were largely unattributable to academic performance in high school. Graduates of programs in business, management, and public administration were among the highest earners, despite average academic performance in high school, while graduates of physical and life sciences and technologies programs had average (or below-average for women) earnings, despite being among the top performers in high school.





About 77,000 or one-quarter of the 307,000 deaths in Canada in 2020 were classified as potentially avoidable, according to a new Statistics Canada report. These deaths were considered to be avoidable with changes in life style or behaviors or treatable with access to proper health care. The rate of potentially avoidable mortality was two times higher in areas with the highest proportions of Canadians with less than a high school education than in areas that had the lowest proportions of people with less than a high school education.
