- Computational social science and demography.



EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

University of Alberta. The Department of Sociology, Faculty of Arts, invites applications for a full-time tenure-track position at the rank of Assistant Professor in the broadly defined area of Work, Economy, and Society. Sub-areas of desired expertise include but are not limited to: work, occupations, and professions; socioeconomic inequality and the life course; care and unpaid work; economic sociology; and global political economy. Strengths in statistics and quantitative methodologies will be considered an advantage. The appointment will begin July 1, 2018.

Baylor University. Pending final budgetary approval, the Department of Sociology is recruiting one tenure-track sociologist for August 2018. Preferred career stage is advanced assistant professor, but we welcome applications from beginning scholars as well. We seek a sociologist who specializes in health and/or family. This individual will be expected to teach undergraduate and graduate courses and contribute substantially to a doctoral program that presently has two emphases: sociology of religion and community analytics (formerly, applied sociology). We are actively building in the health and society area, and it has become a third focus of our graduate training.

Clemson University. The Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice invites applications for a tenure-track assistant professor positions beginning August 2018. Applicants should have a PhD in Sociology by the time of appointment. Specializations of interest are social policy and health including (but not limited to) medical sociology, the social determinants of health, social psychology, mental illness, disabilities, addictions, and/or child and adolescent well-being.

Denison University. The Department of Anthropology and Sociology invites applications for a tenure-track position beginning August 2018. A Ph.D. in Sociology by August 2018 is required. We seek a sociologist whose work is both empirically rigorous and theoretically sophisticated. Desired areas of expertise in research and skills are in quantitative methodology (especially in descriptive and inferential statistics) and in large scale datasets.
